Course Goals

In this course students will develop listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills in Italian as well as an understanding of Italian culture. Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to: Provide basic information in Italian about themselves, their families, interests, likes and dislikes, and daily activities. Participate in a simple conversation on everyday topics (e.g., weather, meeting new people, school, shopping, hobbies, travel, etc.). Read texts on familiar topics. Use links to videos, music, and lessons online. Understand the main ideas, and pick out important information from authentic texts (e.g. newspaper articles, short stories, poems, songs, videos, websites, etc.). Summarize some short authentic texts. Provide general information about Italy (e.g., geography, weather, food, culture, history, etc.). Find, use, and understand essential

vocabulary related to everyday life (e.g., days of the week, colors, numbers, months, seasons, telling time, stores, family members, modes of transportation, and more.) Produce Italian with enough grammatical accuracy and accurate pronunciation to be comprehensible to a native speaker of Italian.

Course requirements

Assignments include, and not only: written papers, voice (oral) short assignments and weekly video presentations, as well as video discussions.

Not doing your assignment is considered as an absence from class.

Final Presentation

There are no exams or midterms.

There is an inclusive, <u>mandatory</u> Two Parts Final. You will not pass the class without passing this Final Presentation. (There will be a Rubric on Canvas and directions.) The Final Presentation includes a written part and an oral part in the form of a video submitted in Voice Thread or MP4.

Required Materials.

<u>No required Textbook</u>. I write and post grammar, assignments, lessons, Power Points, and useful sentences, together with links, and other material every week. Language acquisition is a skill, which needs regular practice. You must follow the class's progress and complete the assignments.

<u>Please</u>, follow the class regularly. If you are ill, please notify me. You are expected to make up the work to pass the class.

ASSESSMENT METHODS:

Student Learning Objectives will be assessed as follows:

- A student's oral and written communication will be determined by their participation (in class discussions, paired orals, a final oral presentation, written assignments, daily conversations, and small pop exercises).
- A student's ability to read and analyze simple Italian original writings will be determined by their ability to recognize words and verbs, expressions, and even new vocabulary from a context.
- A student's writing ability will be determined by their usage of vocabulary, expressions, and grammar and syntax in their writing assignments and the ability to use various original sources and material provided by the instructor.
- A student's ability to create E-mails in Italian will be assessed through an exchange of simple e-mails with the instructor.
- A student's cultural competency will be determined by their participation in (class) discussions, written research papers, and use of Internet sources to complete culture/based tasks.
- A student's ability to translate short paragraphs from English to Italian will be assessed by written and oral (class) work, homework and research.
- A student's ability to translate from Italian to English will be determined by written practice exercises,(small and large group) discussions, and quizzes.
- A student's ability to think logically through the structural composition of Italian will be assessed by translation analysis activities, class discussions, memory exercises and quizzes.

COURSE CONTENT AND CLASS SCHEDULE. (NOTA BENE!)

This class schedule is subject to change depending on class progress. Changes will be announced in canvas/ Announcements/ EMAILS. Please read your emails daily for updates and news.

NOTA BENE: The activities mentioned below in the weekly schedule include different tasks: writing exercises-reading/comprehension exercises-listening/comprehension exercises.

We focus on realistic situations (topics) to accomplish tasks (communicative-translating-writing-learning grammar tasks, etc.)

(You are expected to collaborate with each other, interact, and engage in the activities.) "Languages cannot be taught; they can only be learned". You are responsible for your own learning process. I am just a guide to motivate you, as well as provide tasks that are appropriate for your level and class general progress. It is your responsibility to find your best way of learning!

Other activities include reading online articles about the topics mentioned below, as well as listening to real language with songs, plays, film, and television. These are tools to incorporate the language that you are learning in a real-life context, as well as talk about topics that are relevant to you. Also, (often by working together,) you must find your own answers and complete the task. (Most importantly, you will have a wide variety of tasks to choose from, and each group will be able to decide which task they prefer to work on that day.)

Also: Same of the readings, videos, or research short papers will be about important world facts, current events, Geography, History, Art, Literature, Music, and theatre, and more! You will learn Italian while learning about other important disciplines and facts. Italian Culture: Some of the videos, readings, and activities, (research papers/film, etc.) will introduce you to the Italian culture as well as the language. You will learn about Italian geography, Art, Europe, European Union, Italian cities, UNESCO, as well as food and lifestyle. You will learn about famous Italians, Italian Americans, Italian Americans contributions to the United States development and culture.

<u>Important:</u> one of your responsibilities is to look for as many as possible vocabulary words each week, based on the week's topic and as suggested by the instructor. Create a space in your notebook for each category=vocabulary-verbs-sentences & expressions etc. <u>Remember:</u> all the tasks, activities, readings, assignments, and the likes, are an important part of your grade and mandatory. Although you all learn at a different pace and in a different way, you are responsible for the same amount of work and participation= attendance. These, and not, being the best student, determine your success in passing the class as well as your grade.

<u>Methodology:</u> By providing you with idioms, phrases, proverbs, quotes, etc., (and immersing you in the language), I give you tools like Lego bricks, ready-to-go pieces that you put together. You keep reusing them and adding them to a new context and new sentences, paragraphs, etc.

So: Be creative, be daring, "just do it"!

Behavior: always maintain respectful behavior. This includes using respectful language and comments.
