COURSE DESCRIPTION:

LAN 212 Intermediate German II is conducted entirely in German and develops students' German communication skills through a study of the cultural history of German. 3 lectures,3 credits. Prerequisite: LAN -211 with a minimum grade of C or by permission of the Academic Department Chair. General Education Course.

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of the course requirements, students will be able to:

- 1. Have a greater understanding of the cultural history of Germany;
- 2. Speak in a more fluent manner about the insights he has gained from the readings;
- 3. Conduct conversations in German;
- 4. Communicate (listen, speak, read, and write) in German;
- 5. Recognize and understand and use new grammatical structures;
- 6. Continue to expand familiarity with German culture, history and society through the authors presented in the reader;
- 7. Increase his writing ability;
- 8. Enhance German conversation and writing skills.

ASSESSMENT METHODS:

Students will be assessed on the four skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Each of these skills will be assessed as follows:

- 1. Listening: Participation class discussions, and oral communication with instructor and classmates.
- 2. Speaking: Conversations in German with classmates and instructor regarding the topics in the text.
- 3. Reading: Recognition of the selection's significance through homework response essays, and classroom discussion.
- 4. Writing: Usage of German phrases, sentence structures and vocabulary to organize and express thoughts in essays, quizzes, and exams.
- 5. A students' understanding of cultural issues will be assessed.
- 6. Comprehension and description of a situation: Use and pair/group performances.
- 7. Ability to define, develop, and explain student's area(s) of interest in German.
- 8. Completion of a final presentation. This project will include an essay, an oral presentation to the class, and subsequent discussion involving the entire class.
