FINAL PROJECT

The "Connecting with Our Culture" project allows heritage Spanish speakers to explore and document Hispanic heritage through research, interviews, or creative expression. Students choose from formats like essays, podcasts, or artistic projects to strengthen their cultural connection and Spanish skills. Over five weeks, they research, draft, revise, and present their work, which may be shared as a community resource. Evaluation is based on research, language use, creativity, and cultural relevance.

PARTICIPATION

Being prepared for and participating in class activities is one of the most important means of attaining the goals of this course. Your involvement in classroom discussions and activities will be evaluated by your professor on an on-

going basis and will be officially recorded at the conclusion of each chapter. You may consult with your professor at any time for feedback on your participation and for suggestions on how it might be improved.

HOMEWORK

Regular practice of Spanish is key to reaching the stated objectives of this course. For this reason, you will complete exercises through Canvas as part of your coursework. All of these homework assignments ('Tareas') are web-based and can be accessed from any computer equipped with a web browser. You will receive immediate feedback on your performance as well as a grade for each exercise that you complete. You will be able to track your scores using the web-based Gradebook.

Reminders from your instructor regarding due dates for homework assignments are provided as a courtesy, however, students are ultimately responsible for completing homework assignments in accordance with the course schedule. Any questions for any given homework exercise must be reported to your professor *within 24 hours of the due date.* You should receive an initial reply to your query within 24 hours during weekdays. Use these homework exercises to monitor your understanding of the material as it is covered during the semester. Late reports of any problem with an exercise or set of exercises may not necessarily be honored after the 24-hour period has elapsed. You will need:

- -Laptop/desktop computer with internet access.
- -Computers with a camera and microphone are needed to complete some assignments

LATE POLICY

Late work will be penalized by 5% for every day that it is late. Work that is more than a week late will go ungraded and receive an F. Students who miss an assignment due to an excusable circumstance (e.g. illness, family emergency, college-sanctioned event) should provide the instructor with appropriate documentation, such as a doctor's note, and work with the instructor to determine a reasonable deadline for the submission of the missed assignment.

Other College, Divisional, and/or Departmental Policy Statements:

We encourage you to take advantage of the opportunity to interact with many native Spanish speakers in our region, using them as resources for practicing conversation skills and learning about Hispanic cultures. However, all assigned course work for Spanish classes must be completed on your own. As in any course at the college, cheating is unacceptable and can be grounds for disciplinary action.

Cheating includes but is not limited to: giving or receiving any amount of help on any assignment from anyone other than your instructor or a tutor from BCC's tutoring center; copying information from peers, and answer key, use of ChatGPT or any other generative artificial intelligence (AI); using online translation programs, using online dictionaries for more than isolated words; and presenting work that you did not originally create as if it were your own. Consequences for

academic dishonesty range from receiving a failing grade on the course requirement in questions to receiving an F in the course.

Additionally, any student who uses translators online for more than a word or full sentences and post them on writing activities will receive a "0".
