The course is intended to introduce students to the academic study of music, including music analysis and the historical and sociocultural issues regarding music of that period. The course includes studying the musical elements of timbre, rhythm, melody, harmony, texture, and form. The course studies the historical and sociocultural context of music through the time periods considered. Because MUS-107 is a General Education course, it requires students to complete a variety of critical thinking and writing assignments. These assignments may include class discussions and the application of critical thinking skills, short essays, and examinations containing essay writing.
