This course is an analysis of social welfare philosophies and social service systems in the United States. Through lectures, group participation, field trips/service learning options, students learn to recognize perspectives, definitions, historical developments, dynamics, current issues and trends, and social work roles while working within a multicultural society, as well as the common aspects of helping within the broad field of human services.

Final Project:

Reports indicate that violent incidents increased during the COVID pandemic. In violence prevention work, a model of behavior change is the ecological perspective and the impact of community/physical environment on peoples' lives.

Using a four level ecological model (individual, relationship, community, and societal):

- 1. Explain why violence might have increased during the pandemic. Discuss explanations of each level and how factors at one level influenced factors at another level.
- 2. Develop potential prevention strategies at each level. Consider both, social work prevention measures and governmental reform and prevention methods.
- 3. Finally, summarize how the perspective suggests that in order to prevent violence, it is necessary to act across multiple levels of the model at the same time.

Course Content:

This course introduces human services by discussing historical developments of modern social welfare policies, competing perspectives on social welfare, social work's historical development, the nature and causes of poverty, historical development of antipoverty programs and child welfare.

Social welfare policy
Current welfare policies
Poverty: The central concept, nature and causes
Social welfare policies and programs to combat poverty
Public assistance policy
Child welfare
Policy and welfare reform
