LatinxCEO Seeks to Shatter Glass Ceiling



Latino entrepreneurs from the Bergen Business Accelerator attended the February 21 LatinxCEO launch event.

According to a recent analysis by USA TODAY, Hispanic men and women account for less than four percent of executives at S&P 100 companies – with women facing especially disproportionate odds. Only two executives among the 533 publicly listed corporate leaders identify as a Hispanic female.

LatinxCEO, a new workforce development initiative at Bergen, seeks to provide students with the resources, skills and experience they need to challenge Hispanic underrepresentation in the workplace.

"We will have the opportunity to model community members who look like us and may have had similar life experiences," student Josefhina Navarro said at the program's launch event on February 21 on the College's main campus. "Learning from those who have already achieved success will help us as students understand what it takes to become successful."

LatinxCEO will empower aspiring Hispanic business professionals by providing students with skills, real-world connections and career exploration opportunities. Among the activities, students will network with regional executives, meet entrepreneurs and participate in career shadowing, worksite visits and mock interviews.

The program effectively combines two priorities outlined in the College's strategic goals: creating new workforce development initiatives and enhancing its approach to diversity, equity and inclusion according to President Eric M. Friedman.

"This must begin to change," he said at the launch event, commenting on the underrepresentation of Hispanics in leadership roles. "We have the opportunity to help move the needle. Today, as we introduce the Latinx-CEO program, we're making further progress in supporting our diverse community and developing a next generation workforce."

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The official launch event also featured speakers such as Bergen County Board of Commissioners Vice Chair Germaine Ortiz, New Jersey Statewide Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Chair Luis De La Hoz and the stories of a dozen Hispanic entrepreneurs who will serve as mentors for students taking advantage of the initiative. The entrepreneurs work with the College's business accelerator at Bergen Community College at the Meadowlands in Lyndhurst, which provides them with affordable office space, access to memberships and business coaching at the facility. The Hispanic-business-focused incubator specifically targets assisting early-stage entrepreneurs in the region. The New Jersey Statewide Hispanic Chamber of Commerce maintains its headquarters at the Meadowlands site as well.

Bergen for Business Director Linda Caruso worked with Executive Director of Continuing Education and Workforce Development Cinzia D'Iorio to create the partnerships that provided the basis for LatinxCEO. Previous projects emerging from the division include the "small business support specialist" initiative that has seen Bergen students provide accounting, marketing and operations assistance for more than 600 entrepreneurs. That effort remains a joint partnership of the Bergen County Business Resource Network launched by government leaders.

The College's involvement with the Bergen Resource Network represented one of the first major initiatives emerging from President Friedman's economic recovery committee taskforce. The group, which began meeting shortly after he took office in 2021, serves in an advisory capacity to the president, creating and implementing strategies that position the institution as a catalyst for recovery from the pandemic.

The Stars Come Out at Bergen

The stars come out at Bergen on Wednesday and Friday evenings ... without a celebrity in sight.

This spring, Bergen invites members of the public for free observations of celestial objects through research-grade telescopes at its Emil Buehler Trust Observatory (College Main Campus, 400 Paramus Road, Paramus) and the William D. McDowell Observatory (Richard W. DeKorte Park, One DeKorte Park Plaza, Lyndhurst). Professor Sean McLearie leads the observations on Friday evenings from 7 to 9:30 p.m. in Paramus and on Wednesday evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. in Lyndhurst.

Guests can expect to see objects such as the moon, Mars and the Andromeda Galaxy, though viewing conditions vary based on weather. The observatories remain open for regular viewing hours unless clouds or precipitation completely cover the night sky.

Faculty have led public viewings in Paramus since the observatory's 2003 opening; the College assumed the Lyndhurst observatory's operations in 2015 under an agreement with the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority.

The Office of Student Life and Student Government Association used peanut butter and jelly to spread love for those in need this Valentine's Day. The Cares Center offers food and other emergency services for anyone at the College. Temple University and Wisconsin Hope Lab researchers estimate 42 percent of community college students face hunger or "food insecurity," defined as lacking reliable access to a sufficient quantity of affordable, nutritious food.

Seeing Green with Cannabis Careers

Bergen has launched multiple programs that will provide students with the opportunity to gain a foothold in the burgeoning cannabis industry. Financial research firm Morningstar, Inc. identifies cannabis as a \$10 billion industry in the U.S. with the potential to rise exponentially in the coming decades as more states legalize the growth, use and sale of the plant and its derivatives.

The first program, a certificate of achievement in medicinal and industrial cannabis through the biology and horticulture department, focuses on preparing students for careers in clinical research, development and commercialization. Additional certificates, offered through the Division of Continuing Education and Workforce Development in partnership with Green Flower, a cannabis education provider, prepare students for careers in dispensing, cultivation and manufacturing. Students can enroll in both programs now at Bergen.edu.

Combined, the offerings position Bergen as one of the only colleges in the state to sponsor such comprehensive cannabis education opportunities, according to President Eric M. Friedman.

"Community colleges respond to demands of industry, workforce and the local economy," he said. "With our cannabis programs, Bergen can create new pathways to employment in the state of New Jersey."

In the certificate of achievement program developed under the College's biology and horticulture department, students will begin with classes such as Plant Science (HRT-102) and People Plant Relationships (BIO-130), which provide foundational learning in the disciplines. Students will then tackle cannabisspecific coursework in recently approved classes Physiological Action of Cannabinoids in Humans (BIO-250) and Commercial Practices for the Production of Medical and Industrial Cannabis Species (BIO-251). Students can complete the 18-credit program in as few as three semesters. Ultimately, students will graduate from Bergen with the certificate of achievement and will choose to enter a career or transfer the credits to a four-year institution in pursuit of a bachelor's degree.

Meanwhile, eight-week certificate programs through Green Flower ready students for immediate entry into the workforce as dispensary agents, cultivation technicians and manufacturing agents. The self-paced online programs focus on best practices and developing the skills needed in the workplace. Students who complete the programs will not only have the knowledge needed to obtain employment, but they will connect with potential employers through Green Flower's exclusive network reserved for the program's students. Student-Athlete Scores Award

Three-sport student-athlete Melody Peralta represented the College at the New Jersey Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women "National Girls and Women in Sports Day" celebration, earning Bergen's "Woman of the Year Award." The honor recognizes her contributions to Bergen athletics as a leader, teammate and student. Seton Hall University hosted the 37th annual installment last month, which featured Peralta and 13 other student-athletes from the Garden State Athletic Conference.

"I wasn't expecting it," she said. "I was very honored."

Peralta lettered in three sports in high school – volleyball, basketball and softball – before graduating and entering Bergen. She continues to play all three sports at the College.

The award-winner said she draws inspiration from her "hard-working parents" and four-yearold sister. She plans to transfer to a four-year university after graduating from Bergen and hopes to one day work for the New York Mets.



PTK Accolades for Academic VP



Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. Brock Fisher has earned the "Distinguished College Administrator" award from Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society of two-year col-

leges. Students from Bergen's award-winning Alpha Epsilon Phi chapter nominated Fisher for the honor.

"While you were nominated for this award by the highest-achieving students on your campus, this award is really about your commitment to the success of all students," PTK President and CEO Dr. Lynn Tincher-Ladner said in a letter to Fisher. "They know you are working hard to provide them more opportunities and stronger pathways to completion, transfer and employment.
