#### **Course Description**

German II continues to focus on basic communicative skills: speaking, writing reading and listening. Students will acquire these skills through active participation in the use of vocabulary, grammar and syntax. The class is geared to help students communicate effectively both orally and in writing and reading. This course is designed for students who have taken German I or who have one or two years of High School German. Students with more than two or more years of prior study should consult the World Languages and Cultures Placement Policy on this syllabus.

## **Learning Objectives**

Upon completion of the course requirement, students will be able to:

- 1. Continue acquiring the necessary grammar & syntax to communicate effectively.
- 2. Expand his/her vocabulary in order to comprehend various reading material
- 3. Get a deeper understanding of the various German speaking countries & how they differ from one another, & gain an understanding of people's life styles.
- 4. Students will be able to travel with relative ease & use the German language.
- 5. Talk about 1 of the literary greats in each German speaking country & recite a poem.
- 6. Translate passages from the textbook & transfer that knowledge to everyday material
- 7. Understand the history of the German currency & the Euro.
- 8. Write letters, essays & free write in German
- 9. Understand idiomatic expressions that are unique to Germany.

To accomplish the above mentioned goals, the teacher will rely heavily on text book material but will also assign outside sources of interest that pertain to the lessons.( Websites, museum, library)

## **Assessment Methods**

Each of these student learning objectives will be assessed as follows:

- 1. A student's ability to acquire grammar, syntax & vocabulary skills will be determined by class participation, discussions, assignments, quizzes, tests & translations.
- 2. A student's oral proficiency will be determined by class participation, independent & group presentations & conversations in class.
- 3. A student's understanding of cultural differences between countries discussed will be assessed in discussions and presentations.
- 4. A student's ability to write in German will be assessed in essays & written homework
- 5. A student's ability to translate will be assessed on the assignments given.
- 6. A student's understanding of the importance of the German Language in business & culture will also be determined by his/ her contribution to the class discussion.
- 7. A student's understanding of the power of media/film will be assessed in an essay
