Course Description: American Sign Language II is a continuation of the receptive & expressive skills required to communicate in American Sign Language (ASL). Through active classwork, students will explore Deaf culture & history, education, the Americans with Disabilities Act, vocabulary, syntax & grammar, & controversial issues. Topics will include handshape stories, making requests, use of space, classifiers, & describing people/objects. Students will also write a research paper related to deafness/Deaf Culture. Prerequisite: LAN170.

Signature Assignment: ASL Presentation

Students will be required to videorecord themselves giving a presentation in ASL on an assigned topic. The presentation must be 1-3min & incorporate vocabulary, grammar, NMS & other concepts learned in class.

Course Requirements: In support of the above-mentioned goals, this course will include reading, writing discussion, & assignments from books, videos, lecture & outside sources. Students are strongly encouraged to take an active role in class discussions & practice their expressive & receptive skills. Class participation is expected. Students will answer questions &/or complete online activities online & in class weekly (for class participation grade/ attendance). Students will turn in 6 lab activities (approved list & report forms on Canvas). Students will also be required to give presentations as part of their evaluations. Finally, students will be responsible for a formal paper related to Deaf Culture (approved list & directions on Canvas). For extra credit, students may attend Deaf events (i.e., ASL Tutor, Deaf Culture Club meetings, theatre, Deaf Chats, workshops, etc.) **All assignments must be submitted via Canvas by Thursday 11pm**, unless otherwise specified. Written & videorecorded plagiarism are unacceptable; please see the Student Handbook online for definitions & policies.

Course Content and Class Schedule: This course is intended to build upon material & vocabulary learned in ASL1. students will learn the rules of ASL, including discourse markers, non-manual grammar, syntax, classifiers, temporalization, time concepts, pronominalization, classifiers, locatives, sentence structure & types, and gesture. This course will also include lessons on Deaf culture, history, literature, & controversial issues within the Deaf Community. Prerequisite: LAN170.
