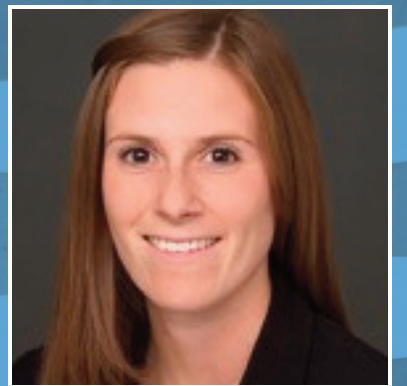
Preventing Genocide: Is Law the Answer?

Rebecca Salk is an attorney with broad experience in private practice, the federal judiciary, and various departments and agencies within the federal government, including the Department of Justice's Office of Foreign Litigation, the U.S. Agency for International Development, and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York. She studied philosophy and political science at the University of Michigan and received her J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center, where she served on the executive board for the Georgetown Journal of International Law. She has written on a range of ethical and legal topics involving international law and human rights, as well as the viability of the death penalty. After graduating from Georgetown, Salk worked as a litigation associate at Cahill Gordon & Reindel in New York City. She currently serves as a law clerk to a federal magistrate judge in the Southern District of New York. In October, she plans to clerk for a federal district judge in New Jersey.
